As his letters attest, for nearly forty years Henry James enjoyed a warm and gratifying friendship with Britain's foremost soldier of the last quarter of the nineteenth century and his wife. The Wolseleys were notable figures. Lord Wolseley, the field marshal who became Britain's commander in chief of the British army, was a national hero. Both a bibliophile and an author, Wolseley was described by Henry James to his brother William as an "excellent example of the cultivated British soldier." Lady Wolseley was also well-read, as well as stylish, strong-willed, and shrewd, and in Henry's view, a delightful correspondent--in short, as the editor writes, "precisely the kind of woman James most admired." In <i>The Master, the Modern Major General, and His Clever Wife</i> , Alan James offers a collection of more than one hundred letters--most of them published here for the first time--that Henry James wrote to the Wolseleys, the majority to Lady Wolseley. Included are an overall introduction to the letters; separate introductory profiles of Lord and Lady Wolseley along with commentaries on the factors that drew James and the Wolseleys together; introductions to each of four sections of the letters, divided chronologically; and annotations throughout, identifying the notable men and women to whom James refers as well as comparing what James and the Wolseleys thought of them and their work. The Moon and Sixpence tells the story of English stockbroker Charles Strickland, who abandons his wife and child to travel to Paris to become a painter. First published in 1919 in the United Kingdom by Heinemann, the story is inspired by the life of the French artist Paul Gauguin. It's told in episodic form from a first-person perspective. The narrator, who came to know Strickland through his wife's literary parties, begins the story as Strickland leaves for Paris. Strickland's new life becomes a stark contrast to his life in London. While he was once a well-off banker living a comfortable life, he must now sleep in cheap hotels while suffering both illness and hunger. Maugham spent a year in Paris in 1904, which is when he first heard the story of Gauguin, the banker who left his family and profession to pursue his passion for art. He heard the story from others who had known and worked with Gauguin. Ten years later Maugham travelled to Tahiti where he met others who had known Gauguin during the artist's time there. Inspired by the stories he heard, Maugham wrote <i>The Moon and Sixpence</i> . Although based on the life of Paul Gauguin, the story is a work of fiction. Imprescindible desde esta obra primeriza.» Leah Bonnín, *La tormenta en un vaso* «Ninguna de las dos tiene nada que decir; tú, porque no te comunicas, y yo, porque no escondo nada», le dice Marianne Dashwood a su hermana mayor Elinor en uno de los pasajes más célebres de *Juicio y sentimiento* (1811), la primera novela que consiguió publicar Jane Austen. Lo no dicho, el secreto deliberado o impuesto, la verdad oculta y la mentira, el pacto de silencio dictado por la lealtad o la piedad, son en efecto los temas principales de esta novela que traza un cuadro tan hilarante como patético de las desventuras de dos hermanas casaderas, hijas de la gentry pero apartadas –en su condición de mujeres– de la fortuna familiar. Ingeniosísima en su trama, cáustica en su pintura de ambientes y personajes, grave en su espíritu moral, ésta es la primera de las obras maestras de Jane Austen. Jane Austen nació en 1775 en Steventon, séptima de los ocho hijos del rector de la parroquia. Educada principalmente por su padre, empezó a escribir de muy joven, para recreo de la familia: una muestra de sus escritos juveniles, fantasiosos y humorísticos, se encuentra en *Amor y amistad*, y, de una forma ya más elaborada, en *Lady Susan* y *los Watson*. A los veintitrés años envió a los editores el manuscrito de *La abadía de Northanger*, que fue rechazado. Trece años después, en 1811, conseguiría publicar *Juicio y sentimiento*, de la que se hicieron dos ediciones, y a la que siguieron *Orgullo y prejuicio* (1813), *Mansfield Park* (1814) y *Emma* (1816), que obtuvieron un gran éxito. Después de su muerte, acaecida prematuramente en 1817 y que le impidió concluir su novela *Sanditon*, aparecería *Persuasión* (1817) y, con ella, *La abadía de Northanger*, que no consiguió publicar en vida.
