Zeus (ZOOS) is a name that many people today recognize. When someone asks, "Who was Zeus?" the answer is often something like, "Um, wasn't he the leader of the Greek gods?" They find that he was not only one of the most important gods in human history. He was also an extremely colorful and entertaining character.
